

<u>"The Way We Were"</u>



One evening a grandson was talking to his grandmother and asked, "How old are you Grandma?"

The grandmother replied, "Well, let me thínk a mínute, I was born before televísion, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, Frísbees, and the pill. There were no credit cards, laser beams, or ball-point pens. Pantyhose, air conditioners, dishwashers, and clothes dryers had not been invented. Space travel was only in Flash Gordon comic books. Computer dating, dual careers, daycare centers, group therapy, McDonald's, instant coffee, FM radios, tape decks, CDs, electric typewriters, yogurt, or guys wearing earrings were unheard of. We thought fast food was eating half a biscuit while running to catch the school bus. Having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with your cousins. Time-sharing meant time the family spent together. We listened to Big Bands, Jack Benny, and the Presídent's speeches on our radíos. 'Made in Japan' meant it was junk. We had 5 & 10-cent stores where you could actually buy things for 5 and 10 cents. A níckel got you an íce-cream cone, a

phone call, a streetcar ríde, a Pepsí, or enough stamps to mail 1 letter and 2 postcards. The minimum wage was 30¢/hr., a new car cost \$1100, gas was 19¢/gal., a house was \$6950, bread was 9¢/loaf, and mílk was 60¢/gal. "Grass" was mowed, "coke" was a cold drínk, "pot" was something your mother cooked in, "rock music" was your grandmother's lullaby, "hardware" was a store, and "software" wasn't a word. So, how old do you thínk I am?" (Grandma is 70 years old)

The Little Brown Jug, the most prestigious 3-year-old pacing race in North America, is held annually on the 3rd Thursday of September at the Delaware County Fairgrounds. 3.) Ohio Wesleyan University. Notable alumni include Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks, First Lady Lucy Webb Hayes, author and theologian Norman Vincent Peale, baseball executive Branch Rickey, Nobel Laureate Frank Sherwood Rowland, and CBS News correspondent, Byron Pitts. I love Delaware. It's a great place to live. Exciting things still happen there. For instance, Delaware is also the home of the Strand Theater which opened in April, 1916, and is the tenth longest continuously operating movie theater in the United States.
