<u>Veterans Day</u>

Nov. 11, 2013 Thank you to all who have served!! Originally called

Armistice Day to celebrate and remember the end of WW I, Veterans Day was designated by Pres. Eisenhower in 1954 to honor all veterans. Frank Woodruff Buckles was the last surviving American veteran of WW I. He died at age 110 in 2011. John Henry Foster "Jack" Babcock was the last surviving Canadian veteran of WW I. He died at age 109 in 2010. The last surviving vet of any nationality was an English woman, Florence Beatrice **Green**, who was a member of the Women's Royal Air Force. She died Feb. 4, 2012, two weeks shy of her 111th birthday. During most of our lifetimes, the last Civil War, Amerícan Indían Wars, Spanísh American War, and WW I veterans have passed away. There are approximately 1.5 million WW II vets still living with a medían age of about 92. If you know a vet, thank them. If you encounter a vet you don't know, thank them. God bless them all.
